Presidents Report

The 75th Anniversary season at the Yellowknife Golf Course has come to an end, it truly has been one of the most unique in our history. It started off with an amazing spring which led to our earliest opening date, and we are closing a week later than usual. Even with the loss of four weeks of operations due to the evacuation we still had a great season.

This year we welcomed a new Clubhouse contractor, The Hungry Wolf, and were provided with excellent food, services, and staff throughout the season. The 75th Annual Midnight Classic Tournament went incredibly well with the largest registration ever, we even had visitors from far and wide, including a couple from Australia who came just to play and participate in the event. The Thursday night opening party with Range Games, Live Music and the One of a Thai food truck was an incredibly fun evening. The organizing committee spent many hours over the winter planning, and all the volunteers worked tirelessly to ensure the event went off without a hitch. The weather cooperated too! The 75th Anniversary branded products were well received and the limited-edition Tee Time beer was a huge hit this summer.

Some of the projects we completed this year were the installation of the new stairs at the clubhouse, the completion of the grass aprons around the 9th and 12th greens and the start of the new Junior tee boxes with 9 completed this year and the last nine to be finished in the spring. We did have some other projects planned but due to the evacuation they were deferred until next season.

The addition of the Junior tee boxes will assist with the push to increase Junior Golf at the course. This year saw a great turnout for the Monday Night Junior program, as well as increased participation in our junior events, including the new Junior tournament held the day after the Par 3 fundraiser. We had a record number of Juniors competing in the Club Championships. Our Director of Golf, Kylie Frederick has created an amazing plan to "Grow the Game" and with the help of Conan Donahue and the other volunteers the future of golf with the youth is looking good.

It has been frustrating dealing with all the issues with the older rental carts this summer.

Thankfully it will cease with these carts, as we will be returning the 23 old carts and receiving 30 new carts in the spring. There are continuing glitches with the GPS systems on the 10 new carts, but we will continue to work out these issues, and hopefully have those resolved in the coming season.

Once again, our Director of Golf Operation Kylie Frederick, the Proshop and Range staff have done an amazing job. Our maintenance crew had their work cut out for them with such a dry season. They kept the course clean and in good shape all year.

The YKGC would not be the great place that it is, without the dedication of the staff, the support of our numerous volunteers, and our local businesses who sponsor holes, tournaments, and other much needed items around the course. I would also like to personally thank the crew at Acasta Heliflight who took both our beverage carts over the winter and completed major overhauls and repairs to them. Acasta also stepped up and completed emergency repairs to the range picker when it failed this summer, once again it's businesses like Acasta and all our other corporate sponsors that make the YKGC successful.

As wonderful as the 75th Anniversary season was, it was tempered at times by the loss of two of our long-term members with Mary-Ellen Savard and Clayton Ravndal passing away after battles with Cancer. These solemn moments remind us all to enjoy life to its fullest and never take any time for granted.

Lastly, thank you to the Board of Directors who put a lot of time and effort throughout the year to ensure the YKGC golf course runs smoothly and has a great future.

Treasurer's Report

2023 FISCAL YEAR

Draft statements at September 30, 2023 are showing approximately a \$358,000 surplus. I am expecting some year-end adjustments such as amortization and capital expenses to decrease this, but we exceeded our budget expectations this year. The exceptional May weather made up for the exceptional fire season.

2023 BUDGET AND VARIANCE

The 2023 approved operating budget estimated an \$90,000 surplus. After adjustments and the remaining year expenses, I expect the actual surplus to be close to \$200,000 due mainly to revenues being over \$100,000 higher than budgeted.

The capital plan showed planned expenses of approximately \$113,000 and between repairs, maintenance, and capital expenses the club has spent close to \$190,000. This includes building the frames for all the junior tee boxes and some deferred maintenance.

2024 BUDGET PLANNING

The last three years have shown some healthy surpluses for the Club, but from pandemics to fires, it continues to be difficult to predict what normal operations are. The plan going into the winter for 2024's budget is to continue with conservative estimates for revenues. However, the cash position gives the next Board an opportunity to plan for some strategic investment.

Rules & Handicap Report

This committee is responsible for helping to educate golfers on the rules of golf, and also the subject of golf handicaps.

- Handicaps were an issue that was brought to our attention over the course of a couple of different tournaments last season, and this had been a concern at some level for several years now. Many golfers either choose not to or didn't know how to input scores for the current season in the CPGA handicap system. This resulted in golfers potentially playing off a handicap which was not an accurate reflection of their current level of skill. This became an issue when putting together teams in scramble tournaments, and also with regard to individual net score prizes during stroke play events. Information was provided to everyone on how to input scores and thereby keep an up to date handicap on the books for all competitive golfers.
 - Earlier this Spring our committee met specifically to discuss handicap rules for 2023 tournaments.
 - For all competitive events played in 2023, it was decided that golfers **must have a minimum of 3 current season scores, and a total of 5 scores over the previous calendar year** in order to have their handicap in effect. Any golfer without 3 current season scores would be allowed to compete, but with a zero handicap. These thresholds may be adjusted from year to year moving forward due to the possibility of a later-in-the-season opening day.
 - Any golfer wishing to have their handicap in effect while competing in competitive events but having valid reasons for not meeting the minimum score threshold(s) could apply to the handicap committee for an exemption. Each application was to be considered by the committee in an expedient manner, and the decision of the committee said to be final.
 - It is felt this was a positive change by many in the club. In future years, the earlier mentioned thresholds may be adjusted (raised), should concerns continue.
- No major rules infractions or controversies were identified over the course of the season's tournaments.

The 75th annual Canadian North Midnight Golf Classic was held at the Yellowknife Golf Club from June 22-25, 2023. With it being a special anniversary year, a committee of YKGC members met over the winter to plan and promote the following extended schedule of events:

Advancement of Junior Golf Committee Report

The 2023 season was an exciting year for Junior Golf. Two new programs were established to go along with the Drive, Chip, and Putt event that took place in August.

Junior Golf Program

This season we established a Junior Golf program on Monday evenings from 5 -7pm. There were driving range sessions lasting from 20- 30 minutes and then the opportunity to go out with other Juniors and play a few holes. We had **33** participants register with the program. The program while very successful was not without a few hiccups. A couple of times we had to cancel the program due to smoke and the related health warnings, our communication could have been better and we will work on improving this. I would like to thank the parents that volunteered to accompany some of the groups on the course. I look forward to next year and hope to build and improve on what we did this year.

Junior Golf Tournament July 9th

On July 9th we held a Junior Golf Tournament using the same tee areas that were used the day before during the par 3 tournament. They played 3 person scrambles on the front nine. We had 23 participants and had an older and younger age category. Scores of 31 and 33 won the 2 categories and included a birdie by the 10 and under team.
